# TRIP PREP





#### Prioritize your carry-on

#### \* Environment

- Panama has hot temperatures in April (85°F - 90°F).
- Pack lightweight, breathable, and moisture-wicking clothing.
- Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of bottled water and electrolytes.
- Be prepared for rain showers (28% chance in April) that pass quickly.
- Protect yourself from insect bites by applying repellent daily.
- Wear long pants tucked into socks in jungle areas.

## **Adapters**

- Panama uses the same power outlets as the United States (Type A and B).
- Standard voltage: 110 V, frequency: 60 Hz.
- Pack a 3 to 2 prong adapter in case Type B sockets are not available.

## **Currency+Tipping**


- U.S. Dollars are accepted in Panama, and the most widely accepted credit cards are Visa and Mastercard.
- When dining out, a 10-15% tip is customarily given to the server.
- Gratuity is already prepaid for a Escapes Excursions.
- Yellow taxis aren't metered and official rates are usually ignored. Be sure to negotiate your fare in advance. Tips are not expected.
- Bargaining is not widely practiced in Panama, although you may be able to get a discount when buying handicrafts at local markets.







# PASSPORTS, VISAS, AND DOCUMENTS

U.S. citizens require a passport to enter Panama and return home. The passport must have at least six months validity remaining to be allowed entry. Make sure the name on your boarding pass matches the name on your passport, including middle names or initials.

If you do not have a U.S. passport, additional visas and/or documentation may be required. It is your responsibility to review the Panamanian requirements for your specific passport and ensure you are set to travel.

Take photos to create a backup of all your important travel documents. These include a copy of your passport, driver's license, health insurance card, and credit cards. To keep your original documents secure, utilize the hotel safe and/or invest in a money belt.

Always keep your passport safe and secure and do **NOT** pack it in your checked bag.



# TRAVEL SAFETY

- Panama is one of the safest countries in Central America, but it is always wise to take a few precautions when traveling
- As in any big city, steer clear of poorly lit streets or wandering around new neighborhoods alone after dark.
- Be cautious of pickpocketing in crowded areas of Panama City.

- Avoid carrying all your credit cards or money on you and leav valuables in your hotel safe.
- Tap water is generally drinkable in Panama, but you should stick to bottled water outside of the resort.
- Always carry a copy of your passport and important contact phone numbers.

# TRAVELDAY



#### **Arrival Time**

Most airports recommend arriving three hours prior to your scheduled departure time for international flights. Please note that checked baggage is only accepted within four hours of your scheduled departure.

#### **Airline Reservations**

You will receive your flight information in an email as well as in your pre-trip box. Use your confirmation code to view your reservation on the airline's website or app. There you may make itinerary changes, confirm your seats, and check-in to your flight 24 hours prior to departure.

#### **Pre-/Post Night Transportation**

If you booked a pre- and/or post-night through our registration process, we will take care of your transportation to and from the hotel. If you booked separate accommodations outside of the Westin Playa Bonita, you will be responsible for your own transportation.

# CUSTOMS/ IMMIGRATION

When traveling to Panama, guests must pass through Customs and Immigration. A Customs Declaration Form will be handed out during your flight. Fill it out and keep it with you as you exit the plane. On the form, you will be asked about the following information:

- least six months of expiration.
- Some nationalities must present a tourist visa before their trip to Panama. If this is the case for you, we recommend going directly to the Panamanian consulate in your country, Service of Panama page, or check with your airline.
- Proof that you have a valid passport within at Return ticket to the country of origin or the next destination to visit.



# HISTORY

#### The Power of the Isthmus

Panama's unique and isolated geography has made it a global crossroads throughout history. The indigenous peoples lived in isolated villages bordered by thick jungles and relied on the abundant fish populations in the surrounding waters. The name "Panama" itself comes from an old indigenous word meaning "abundance of fish."

Despite the lack of influence from larger pre-Columbian civilizations, the region was part of a great Pan-American trading route. Gold, ornaments, pottery, and other goods passed through Panama.



#### **Spanish Colonization**

In the early 1500s, Spanish colonizers discovered the land isthmus of Panama. They founded Panama City, which became a vital base for trade and exploration. With easy access to both the Pacific and Atlantic oceans, Panama City played a crucial role in their conquest of Central and South America.

#### Rise and Fall

This extraordinary wealth drew a lot of attention. Panama City faced destruction in 1671 when it was attacked and burned by buccaneers led by the English pirate Henry Morgan. The city was rebuilt over time, and present-day Panama City lies three miles west of the original location.

#### The Path to Independence

After years of political changes, Panama became part of the Republic of Colombia. By the late 1800s, Colombia was in the grip of a civil war and calls for Panamanian secession were increasing. The United States had already declared that it was going to build a transcontinental canal through Panama. This gave Panama's pro-independence movement a boost. In 1903, Panama declared independence with U.S. protection and granted the U.S. control of the Panama Canal Zone.

### **Regaining the Canal**

In 1999, the ownership and control of the Panama Canal was officially transferred back to Panama. Since then, Panama has been responsible for the operation, maintenance, and development of the canal, ensuring its continued role as a key connector of global trade.



#### **Canal Expansion**

After an intensive construction program from 2009-2016, the Third Set of Locks were added to the operation of the Panama Canal, allowing for the passage of larger vessels and increasing the canal's capacity and efficiency.

#### **Engineering Marvel**

Utilizing a system of locks, the Panama Canal raises and lowers ships as they traverse a 48-mile-long waterway. This engineering feat, along with artificial lakes and channels, allows vessels of various sizes to seamlessly navigate the canal.

#### **Global Trade**

As a vital link between the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans, the Panama Canal has had a profound impact on global trade, significantly reducing shipping distances and costs. Today, roughly \$270 billion dollars worth of goods pass through the canal via cargo ships annually.

#### Wildlife and Ecosystem


The region's ancient role as a land bridge allowed species to migrate between continents, which in turn has created a rich intermixture of plant and animal life. Panama's wildlife is varied with sloths, anteaters, and armadillos — which originated from South America — as well as jaguars, tapirs, and deer from North America. There are also several species of giant sea turtle that lay their eggs on the beaches.

National parks and reserves occupy about one-sixth of the nation's land area, and they provide a window into the great variety of landscapes and ecosystems across the country, including tropical rainforests, savannas, cool montane forests, tidal lands, coral reefs, and beaches.

#### Panama Today

Today, Panama enjoys a vivacious blend of cultural influences that are expressed in the country's cuisine, artwork, music, and literature. Its capital, Panama City, is a cosmopolitan hub where skyscrapers tower high above whitewashed bungalows. The city is located at the Pacific entrance of the Panama Canal, and it serves as the country's political, commercial, and financial center.

# CULTURE

Panama's vibrant culture has been driven by centuries of migration and trade. The result is a rich melting pot that influences everything from language and dress to music and food. Indigenous traditions coexist with Spanish culture, and these are intertwined with Afro-Antillean influences from the country's northern provinces. Chinese and American influences can also be felt, and as more and more people call this country home, the culture continues to evolve and take new shapes.

#### **Folklore**

Traditional Panamanian culture is vividly expressed through both dance and dress. There are a number of traditional dances, and the Gala Pollera and the Montuno are two eye-catching national outfits. Beautifully ornate, they consist of handmade skirts and shirts and are often complemented with combs, necklaces, and tembleques.

### **Family and Society**

Family is everything in Panama. As the most important social unit, it's not uncommon to find multiple generations living under the same roof, and many Panamanians will live at home well into adulthood.

### **Perception of Time**

Tranquilo is a word you may hear when traveling in Panama. It means peaceful and reflects Panamanian perceptions of time. Rather than strict adherence to a schedule, things move more fluidly, with emphasis placed on people and relationships.







National pride runs deep in Panama. Best summed up by the popular Panamanian phrase, puente del mundo, corazón del universo (which means bridge of the world, heart of the universe), everyone's love for the country is contagious. As unique as Panama is, many of its customs are rooted in familiar influences. Spanish

culture has influenced everything from family dynamics to religion, with several major holidays and festivals based in Catholicism. The U.S. has also made a large impact in Panama. You'll often see people wearing American clothes or listening to American music, especially in Panama City.

#### Music

Music infuses Panama. The country's influential styles draw on its rich and varied cultural history, and you'll find yourself moved by the traditional cumbia-style tipico, as well as the percussive folk music known as tamborito. But no discussion of music would be complete without mention of Reggaeton. The style got its start as Reggae en Espanol or "Spanish Reggae," and it is by far Panama's most popular genre.

## **Sports**

While boxing is the sport that first put Panama on the map, the nation's most popular sport is baseball. The country's most recognizable athlete is Mariano Rivera, who was a closing pitcher for the New York Yankees for nineteen seasons. Soccer is also popular, especially with Panama's classification into the 2018 FIFA World Cup. All of Panama's Olympic medals come from track and field athletes. Its first Olympic gold medal was achieved by long jumper, Irving Jahir Saladino Aranda, at the 2008 Beijing Olympics.

## **Culture Tips**

The people of Panama are extremely friendly and easy-going, but it is still polite to avoid subjects involving religion or politics. This includes aspects of the country's colonial history such as the construction of the Panama Canal. Please note that while the history of the canal may be touchy, the Panama Canal itself is one of the country's most famous attractions and is a source of tremendous national pride.



# CUISINE

You are sure to eat well in Panama! The country's world-famous cuisine is rich and multi-layered due to its many cultural influences. In fact, Panama City has been a Gastronomy UNESCO Creative City since 2017.

## Ropa Vieja

Ropa vieja translates to "old clothes." According to a Spanish legend, when a poor man ran out of food, he cut up his old clothes to make stew. Squint and you might just see how the shredded beef evokes the image of tattered pants. Cooks simmer the shredded beef with tomatoes, onion, garlic, peppers, and sometimes olives, and season the mix with paprika, oregano, coriander, and other spices of Spanish origin.

#### Chicheme

Some label chicheme a drink, while others think of the sweet liquid as a dessert. Ponder the distinction while sipping this refreshing Panamanian beverage made from boiling corn with evaporated milk, cinnamon, and sugar. Chicheme can be served ice-cold as a cool tonic on hot days, or warm, like tea. Chicheme's roots go back to Panama's indigenous peoples, who concocted a corn-based drink.

#### Ceviche


"Panama," in one of the region's indigenous languages, translates to "an abundance of fish." As in many coastal countries, ceviche, small pieces of raw fish, often white sea bass in Panama, are marinated in a mixture of lime juice, herbs, and onions.

#### **Patacones**

"Patacones" are a local name for fried plantains or tostones. Patacones, fashioned from twice-toasted, unripe green plantains, make for a tasty appetizer or snack. Often starchy and a little bland, locals eat patacones with ketchup, cheese, or any favorite dipping sauce.







# COMMON WORDS PHRASES

It's always helpful to know a few words and phrases in the language of the country you're visiting. With Spanish being the official language of Panama, some words and phrases may already be quite familiar, while others are specific to Panama.

#### Mucho Gusto

Used when meeting someone for the first time and means "a pleasure to meet you." Panamanian people generally hug each other when greeting and they may also include a single kiss on the cheek. If shaking hands, don't use too tight a grip as this can be perceived as slightly aggressive.

#### Buenas

A catch-all term for "hello" that is the most common way to greet people. Panama is a very friendly place and even strangers greet each other in passing. In more formal settings, the form 'Buenas Dias' (Good Day) or 'Buenas Tardes' (Good Evening) should be used instead.
